What does A1.1 mean?

This means you can:

- identify when people give important and specific information, for example about places, dates and times.
- understand simple descriptions of rooms, familiar places, objects and activities with the help of pictures.
- follow simple conversations in everyday social situations.
- understand important information about people, their likes and dislikes and everyday activities in short conversations when speakers speak slowly and clearly.
- follow short recordings on familiar topics.

How can I improve my English?

- Practise listening to short conversations when speakers talk about everyday activities, work and school, what they do and don't like.
- Try to focus on the important information about people, places, objects and activities in longer conversations.
- Practise listening to radio, TV and online recordings where the visuals help follow what people are saying.
- Listen to conversations where people have different opinions on a topic.
- Watch online recordings where people talk about their experiences and opinions.

What does A2.1 mean?

This means you can:

- understand texts that describe people, places and everyday life when they are written in simple language.
- understand basic sentence patterns with simple grammar and common expressions in texts about you and other people, activities and possessions, etc.
- understand short simple personal letters, emails and other messages.
- find important factual information in short texts about familiar topics and situations.
- · identify the main points of short texts such as articles that report familiar news stories

How can I improve my English?

- Spend more time reading different sorts of stories for pleasure.
- Practise reading longer texts that have more detailed descriptions of people and events.
- Practise reading texts to find the key factual information and to know what they are about as quickly as possible.
- Read texts about places and events and people's emotions in newspapers and magazines.
- Practise reading texts that present arguments, discuss solutions to problems and talk about causes and effects.

What does A2.1 mean?

This means you can:

- communicate with other people in simple conversations on everyday topics.
- read aloud a short text based on a common situation and pronounce familiar words and phrases quite clearly, and generally use the correct stress, rhythm and intonation.
- answer a range of questions about everyday objects, places and activities that people do.
- describe people, places, possessions, daily routines and everyday activities that you can see in pictures and give your opinion about what you can see in simple terms.
- give your opinion on everyday topics using a range of words and phrases in simple grammatical structures.

How can I improve my English?

- Learn more words, phrases and expressions to help you talk about more topics and a wider range of familiar situations in greater detail.
- Focus on pronouncing more English sounds clearly and comfortably, using the right intonation and stress patterns in words and sentences so what you say is easier to understand.
- Practise describing a range of different every situations and giving your opinion on what is happening in pictures.
- Practise talking about things that are happening or which have happened
- Learn more ways of giving your opinion on different topics.

What does B2.1 mean?

This means you can:

- use a range of grammar structures accurately when writing.
- spell with reasonable accuracy.
- write clear and detailed descriptions on a variety of subjects related to things you are interested in.
- write letters, texts and emails that convey degrees of emotion and highlight the personal significance of events and experiences and give your opinions on them.
- write essays which develop an argument, giving reasons in support of or against a particular point of view and explaining the advantages and disadvantages of various options.

How can I improve my English?

- Practise writing more complex texts that clearly highlight the key information effectively so you can express yourself clearly and precisely.
- Practise writing in more formal registers using appropriate grammar and vocabulary.
- Learn to write essays, reports and descriptions that are well-structured with main and secondary points, clearly supported by reasons for your ideas and relevant examples.
- Write texts using idiomatic expressions appropriate to the intended reader.
- Practise writing creative and imaginative texts that engage the readers.
