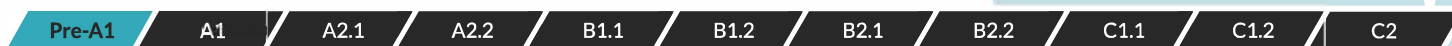

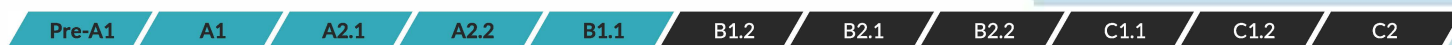

Listening CEFR Level: Pre-A1

What does Pre-A1 mean?

This means you can recognize and understand:

- everyday, familiar words in simple questions and answers when they are spoken slowly and clearly.
- numbers, prices, dates, and days of the week when spoken slowly and clearly.
- simple descriptions of familiar places, objects, and activities.
- simple, factual information in short conversations.
- short talks and recordings on familiar topics.

What can I do to continue to improve my English level?

Here are some suggestions. Practice listening to:

- descriptions of people, places, objects, and everyday activities.
- short conversations in everyday situations, for example in shops, restaurants, on public transportation, or in school.
- important information in announcements in public places or on TV or on the radio.
- short talks on topics you find interesting
- discussions between two or more speakers on everyday topics.

Reading CEFR Level: A1

What does A1 mean?

This means you can read and understand:

- the main points of a short simple text on a familiar topic.
- texts with sentences that have simple grammatical structures.
- short texts on subjects of personal interest when they are written using simple words and grammar.
- simple notices or social media posts, for example, giving details about an event.
- short stories about everyday social themes described in simple words.

What can I do to continue to improve my English level?

Here are some suggestions.

- Practice reading a variety of short posts on social media or other online sites on a range of topics.
- Practice reading short stories and descriptions about people and their lives.
- Read short texts that focus on everyday situations, such as news reports or simple articles, and find the important factual information.
- Spend more time reading short stories, both fiction and non-fiction, for pleasure.
- Read stories in the news on subjects that interest you, or that you want to learn more about.

Writing CEFR Level: Pre-A1

What does Pre-A1 mean?

This means you can:

- write some simple phrases and short sentences using the right word order.
- spell a number of familiar words.
- write short phrases to give basic information about a familiar topic.
- answer simple questions and give basic information about yourself and other people in writing.
- write and give simple information about everyday situations.

What can I do to continue to improve my English level?

Here are some suggestions:

- Learn to spell and write basic phrases and expressions for everyday situations.
- Practice writing simple phrases and sentences about you, your friends and family, where you live, what you do, and what you like to learn about.
- Practice reading and replying to different sorts of short text messages, emails, or social media posts from friends, family, and other people.
- Learn to describe different pictures that show everyday situations.
- Write short essays to say what you think about familiar topics.

Speaking CEFR Level: B1.1

What does B1.1 mean?

This means you can:

- use a wide range of simple language to have conversations on familiar topics.
- read aloud a short text and pronounce most words clearly so they can be understood very easily, and generally use the correct stress, rhythm, and intonation in words, phrases, and sentences.
- use a good range of vocabulary on a large number of familiar topics and everyday situations.
- describe a variety of situations in good detail without needing to prepare or hesitate too much.
- give your opinions and exchange information on topics that are familiar, of personal or academic interest, or relevant to everyday life.

What can I do to continue to improve my English level?

Here are some suggestions:

- Try to take an active part in discussions on a wide range of familiar subjects
- Focus on pronouncing the full range of English sounds clearly and comfortably, and on using the right intonation and stress patterns in less familiar words and longer sentences.
- Improve your vocabulary by learning and practicing word combinations and collocations that are relevant in more contexts.
- Practice giving detailed descriptions on a wide range of subjects related to your social and academic interests and things you are familiar with.
- Practice giving your point of view clearly, evaluating alternative proposals, and making and responding to hypotheses.
